TICKETING

The festival box office will be open daily during the festival from one hour before each day's first screening. It is highly recommended, though, to book your tickets in advance online at VTIFF.ORG. If you purchased a Gold Pass or 10-pack, or if you are a VTIFF Patron Member, you can book in tickets in advance, or you can go to the Information Desk at the festival to redeem tickets for specific films of your choice. All Access Members do not need to book - your seats are guaranteed. If you choose not to book in advance, you can go directly to the screening with your Gold Pass – you do not have to get a ticket at the box office. We hold back a certain number of seats for Gold Pass holders (that includes also our Patron Members) up to 10 minutes before each show on a first-come – first-served basis. After that, we reserve the right to sell the tickets, especially if the screening is in high demand.

We think of the festival as being akin to a curated art show and the opposite of a dealer's gallery: it is not a random collection of films, but a carefully selected program, designed to inspire our audience to discover cinematic connections between the work of filmmakers around the globe.

Film festivals are not only a feast for the eyes but also a great opportunity to discover other cultures and share ideas. Only the Made Here Showcase, covering films from Northern New England and Québec, is open to submissions. We are committed to supporting regional filmmakers and want to make sure that all have an equal chance of being considered. I encourage you to come to these free screenings (with a suggested donation) and support local filmmakers in the Northeast and Québec.

I hope we've succeeded in including a representative selection of the best of international and American cinema, and I only regret that we had to leave out so many good films for lack of space.

There will be many filmmakers attending the festival. They are listed on page 26-28 of this guide. You will see them at post-screening Q&As and at the daily receptions. Don't be shy — talk to them and make them feel welcome. We want them to go home and tell people about VTIFF and Vermont. Filmmakers from far away will be joining us through Skype.

I say this every year, but that doesn't make it less true: A film festival is an opportunity to immerse yourself in the cinematic arts and watch films as they are meant to be seen — on a big screen, in a dark room full of friends and strangers. But it is also an opportunity to discuss the films you have seen at post-screening Q&As and daily receptions, where you can eat, drink and seek recommendations from others.

Do you wonder why some films are showing only in the Film House and others only in the Black Box? We try as far as possible, when a film has two screenings, to show one in each of the theaters, but this is not always possible: the highest standard of projection today is a format called DCP. In an ideal world all our screenings would be projected in that format. But the Black Box has no DCP capability. Because increasingly distributors insist on providing us only DCP formats (they are better protected against piracy) we have to schedule both screenings of these titles in Film House. And so, because the number of slots we have at the festival are finite, some of the other films only show in the Black Box (do not worry - it has a very good projector). Upgrading a theater to project DCP is extremely expensive and we are grateful to Main Street Landing for having invested in a DCP projector in Film House a couple of years ago.

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

Lea Tsemel defends Palestinians: from feminists to fundamentalists, from non-violent demonstrators to armed militants. As a bitterly divisive Jewish Israeli lawyer who has represented political prisoners for nearly 50 years, Tsemel pushes the praxis of a human-rights defender to its limits. *Advocate* is an up close and personal portrait of this tireless advocate and a riveting film. Through the depiction of specific cases and Tsemel's inner conflicts, the film succeeds in highlighting universal questions, such as: What do human-rights lawyers really try to achieve – representation of the best interests of their clients, or fighting for the "bigger cause»? Or, how do you engage with a justice system that represents the state's interests? ~OY

In a yurt on the snow-covered fields of the North, Nanook and Sedna live following the traditions of their ancestors. Alone in the wilderness, they look like the last people on Earth. Their traditional way of life starts changing - slowly, but inevitably. Hunting becomes more and more difficult, the animals around them die from inexplicable causes, and the ice has been melting earlier every year. Their daughter Ága left the icy tundra long ago after a family feud. When Sedna's health deteriorates, Nanook embarks on a long journey to find Ága. Exquisite cinematography does more than justice to the majestic landscapes and the interiors, which are lit like 17th century Dutch paintings. This explicit riff on Robert Flaherty's Nanook of the North will draw you into its world, and the breathtaking last shot will stay in your memory for days to come. It's a film that has to be seen on the big screen. ~OY

One of the most influential and innovative directors of the silent era, Alice Guy-Blaché was the first female filmmaker. In 1896, at age 23, she was inspired to make her own film called La Fée aux Choux (The Cabbage Fairy), one of the first narrative films ever made. Over the span of her career, she wrote, produced or directed hundreds of films, including 150 with synchronized sound during the silent era. Her work includes comedies, westerns and dramas, as well as films with groundbreaking subject matter such as child abuse, immigration, birth control and female empowerment. She also etched a place in history by making the earliest known surviving narrative film with an all-black cast. After a decade of making films at Gaumont in Paris, she had a second decade-long career in the U.S., where she built and ran her own studio, Solax, in Fort Lee, New Jersey. Green organizes her film like a detective story, tracking down every U.S.-based connection she can find via Ancestry.com and the phone directory. Green's approach distinguishes this film from earlier documentaries made about Guy-Blaché, unearthing materials hidden in family albums and storage cartons. ~OY

From the creators of the Oscar-nominated *Ernest & Celestine*, *The Big Bad Fox* uses its classic animation style to tell a series of utterly beguiling stories the whole family can enjoy. ~OY

This joyous film combines humor and heart with such ease that sometimes the audience has barely caught their breath from laughing before tears begin to flow. Following three estranged adult siblings (an astronaut, an actor and a teacher) on the road to visit their estranged father, we witness these urban characters forced to interact with the very different culture of their youth. As they move further away from their westernized lifestyles to the collectivist, traditional village in Turkey where they were born, the tone and artistic references shift, giving the film many layers of depth and power. However, Butterflies can just as easily be enjoyed as a simple family comedy-drama in which the characters face their long-avoided childhood traumas together — and in doing so discover their true identities. ~JS

In 1920, one brilliant film catapulted the movement known as German Expressionism into film history. The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari reflects the mistrust of authority developed in the immediate post-World War I era and depicts a power that is brutal and insane, manipulating those under its observation to their own whim. Director Robert Wiene and a visionary team of designers crafted a nightmare realm in which light, shadow and substance are abstracted. It's a world in which a demented doctor and a carnival sleepwalker perpetrate a series of ghastly murders in a small community. Distortions and mangled perspectives are constant; bold brush strokes paint shadows equally with sharp edges and round curves, as lines and structures twist and strike to form nightmarish shapes. While Expressionism was by no means the only cinematic style flourishing in Germany at that time (think of the romantic comedies of Ernst Lubitsch's silent films), it was certainly the most sensational. We will be screening a 4K restoration scanned from the (mostly) preserved camera negative at the German Federal Film Archive. ~OY

CHAINED FOR LIFE

A beautiful actress struggles to connect with her disfigured co-star on the set of a European auteur's English-language debut. Through pitch-black satire, Chained for Life examines the treatment of disability on screen and on set. The film undermines conventional ideas about what constitutes beauty and sincerity onscreen. It even hints at a loose parallel between plastic surgery, which can be seen as helping people look the way they feel inside, and filmmaking; both are mechanisms for creating illusions, but also have the potential for revealing hidden truths. Schimberg's film is odd, darkly funny and — when it means to be — a little frightening.

The first feature film from theater director and actress Lila Avilés, The Chambermaid concerns a hotel housekeeper named Eve (played by the marvelously understated Gabriela Cartol) who dreams of a better life while grinding through her daily routine. Inspired by Sophie Calle's 1984 photo collection L'Hotel, Avilés shot the film in just 17 days, using her own savings to fund the production. With a keen eye for detail and precise shot compositions that recall the minimalist cinema of Belgian master Chantal Akerman, Avilés frames the blue-collar tasks of the titular maid against the opulence of a luxury hotel in Mexico City and its wealthy patrons. And though the camera never leaves the hotel, considerable tension is generated through our fear that Eve will be caught deviating from the rigid demands of her job. Like Alfonso Cuarón's Roma, The Chambermaid is a humanistic film about class differences and the dehumanization of manual labor that celebrates the dignity of doing a job well. ~LB

Writer-director Chinonye Chukwu uses calibrated artistry across the board to tell a sensitive story about a prison warden's very challenging position of power. In a stunning opening scene, we see a lethal injection go wrong while the camera focuses on the immobile face of the warden (Alfre Woodard). The scene sets the tone for the dual concerns of this drama — the impact of the death penalty on the accused, as well as its impact on the civil servants whose job it is to ensure the state execution is carried out according to the rule of law. While the script and direction deserve much of the credit for the film's success, this would not be the same movie without the towering screen presence of Alfre Woodard, ~OY

THE DAYS TO COME (ELS DIES QUE VINDRAN)

The Days to Come is the third in Carlos Marques-Mercet's dissection of intense relationships hampered by external circumstances. 10.000 Km, shown at VTIFF in 2015, depicted a relationship conducted through the internet. Hope focused on couples who didn't always communicate in their mother tongue. The Days to Come presents the life of a couple under one roof and under the microscope — from conception to the birth of their child. Over nine months they will have to learn what it will mean to be the three of them, despite not having had the time to learn how to be just the two of them. Although a fiction film, the film takes advantage of the actor's actual pregnancy and is shot in cinema vérité style, as it explores how difficult it can be to share the process of this profoundly transformative experience. As one of our programmers wrote: "Intimate boy-knocks-up-girl story embossed with real pregnancy (no pillows here!) finds the spine and walks all over it." ~OY

There isn't another film quite like it at the festival, or perhaps anywhere. Part loopily queer sci-fi thriller, part faux-naive political rallying cry, all glued together with candy-floss clouds of romantic reverie. Diamantino borrows all the traditional nasty-scientist tropes and rom-com clichés but applies a transgressional palette. It touches on the current refugee crises in Europe as well as the rise of extreme nationalism without for a minute abandoning its tongue-in-cheek tone. No words will prepare you for it, but we're willing to bet that you'll never look at fluffy puppies in the same way again. ~OY

The plot of A Family Tour is deceptively simple. A Chinese filmmaker living in Hong Kong travels to a festival in Taipei to present a film that has been banned in mainland China. She uses the trip as an opportunity to see her mother, but to avoid attention they can only meet surreptitiously under the guise of a guided sightseeing tour. It's a story that closely mirrors writer-director Ying Liang's own situation. In 2012, after his film When Night Falls was deemed subversive by the Chinese government, he was forced to flee his home for Hong Kong. On one level, the film deftly examines questions of national identity and the political complexities that separate mainland China, Hong Kong and Taiwan. At the same time, it serves as a poignant family drama about the cost of abandoning one's homeland and familial roots in the pursuit of truth through art. A Family Tour was completed prior to the massive demonstrations that began in March, following a proposed bill that would have allowed Hong Kong residents to be extradited to mainland China. With violent clashes between pro-democracy protestors and police in Hong Kong making headlines across the globe, the quiet urgency of Ying's film has only grown more relevant. ~LB

Philippe Lesage's *Genesis* is a rarity: a coming-of-age film that explores the angst of adolescence from both male and female, and gay and straight, perspectives. Charlotte (Noée Abita) is a college-age Montréaler navigating the perplexing landscape of newfound freedom and open relationships. Her 16-year-old half-brother, Guillaume (Théodore Pellerin), is a student at an all-boys boarding school coming to terms with his sexual identity in a severely repressive environment. Lesage makes some courageous narrative choices. Charlotte's and Guillaume's stories briefly overlap on just two occasions. A Faulkner-esque coda boldly ventures into uncharted cinematic waters more akin to experimental literature. Refreshingly free of clichés and with fluid camerawork and strong performances from its young leads, Genesis asks if the idyllic feelings of first love can be recaptured during the messy confusion of young adulthood. ~LB

Vic, a transport driver for people with disabilities, is having a rough day. The boss is already busting his chops for running behind schedule when a group of fellow Russian Americans find themselves without a ride to a funeral. Meanwhile, Vic (the charismatic Chris Galust, in his first role) is desperately trying to get his regular riders to their various appointments when a race riot breaks out on his Milwaukee route. Give Me Liberty is the second feature for Russia-born director Kirill Mikhanovsky, who himself worked as a medical transport driver in Milwaukee before becoming a filmmaker. Mikhanovsky's experiences lend the film a lived-in authenticity, as does the casting of actors who have disabilities, including Lauren "Lolo" Spencer as an African American woman with ALS who develops a tentative relationship with Vic. Give Me Liberty is an absurdly funny film, in a style reminiscent of the Safdie brothers' Good Time and Martin Scorsese's After Hours, which also examines racial tensions in one of America's most segregated cities. ~LB

During his four-decade career as a photographer and explorer, James Balog (Chasing Ice) has focused his lens on the complex relationship between humans and nature. Human activity has now surpassed all other forces shaping our world, and Balog's work challenges us through breathtaking cinematography to contemplate our place in — and responsibility to — the natural world. The Human Element visits Tangier Island, a fishing community facing the imminent reality of sea level rise threatening their future. We meet Yadira Sanchez and her three children in Denver, Colorado, all of whom attend a special school for children struggling with respiratory issues. Balog embeds with a Cal Fire strike team on the frontlines of the most expensive wildfire in California history, and he ventures deep into Kentucky coal country, meeting unemployed miners finding hope from a new source. Balog argues that the fifth element — the human element — can bring the whole system back into balance, ~OY

Coproduced by the state film organizations of Fidel Castro's socialist regime and the Soviet government, I Am Cuba is a series of four vignettes about the Cuban revolution that melds the urgent thrust of the propaganda films perfected by Sergei Eisenstein with the anything-goes aesthetics of the French New Wave. While each of the four segments serves as a fascinating time capsule of a tipping point in Cuban history, the film's greatest asset is its mind-boggling camerawork. In one scene, a fisheye wide shot literally turns aquatic as the camera plunges from a hotel balcony into a swimming pool. In the film's most virtuoso sequence, a shot begins by tracking a funeral at street level. The camera then rises to the rooftops, tracks into a cigar factory, and finally soars high above the funeral procession — all in one unbroken shot, more than a decade before the Steadicam was invented. Presented in a sparkling 4K restoration by Milestone Films, I Am Cuba has never looked better. Yes, it's propaganda. But propaganda has never been so technically spectacular. ~LB

What was the Argentinian mindset immediately preceding Jorge Rafael Videla's right-wing military coup? The underlying tension is palpable throughout and affects all walks of life. But the film is primarily concerned with the disintegration of morals and society during times of uncertainty and lawlessness through the perspective of a complicit middle-class community, including a respectable judge and his family. The Swiss-French director Barbet Schroeder completes his "Trilogy of Evil" (General Idi Amin Dada: A Self Portrait; Terror's Advocate) with The Venerable W., about a Buddhist monk in Myanmar who uses strong anti-Muslim and anti-Rohingya rhetoric in his speeches and writings. Schroeder's singular style, as he expressed in an interview with the BBC, is "not to judge those people, but to make them talk and find out more about them and eventually ... give them enough rope to hang themselves." And so, in this film, he relies partly on our ignorance of the conflicts in Myanmar and plays up the noble aspects of Buddhist culture, while gradually letting the monk, Ashin Wirathu, self-indict. In a sense, this is the most terrifying of Schroeder's portraits, because unlike Amin, for example, we also see Wirthu's followers through footage culled from phone videos and other immediate media sources. Wirathu represents an awful idea, one that cannot be banished, and one he propagates with chilling skill. "What was terrifying for me," said Schroeder, "was my realization that you can meet evil people every day and fail to notice them. It's not as if there is a big flashing light next to their heads." The final words of the Buddhist Burmese song at the end of the film — "We'll wall our country with our bones if we have to" — are quite chilling. ~OY

CARLOS MARQUES-MARCET (THE DAYS TO COME) Carlos Marques-Marcet is an editor and director, known for 10,000 Km (shown at VTIFF 2016), Anchor and Hope and The Days to Come. He

lives in Barcelona.



MELINDA MOULTON (OUR BODIES, OUR DOCTORS) Melinda serves on the Boards of Planned Parenthood of Northern New England and Vermont Main Street Alliance. Over the past

30 years she has put her energy and time, in a variety of ways, to focus on environmental concerns and the improvement of the status of women.



RANDAL PIERCE (THE CABINET OF DR. CALIGARI) Randal Pierce music directs for the Flynn Theater, Vermont Stage Company and the University of Vermont. He writes music for films,

theater pieces and runs a regular silent film series with Main Street Landing. Randal also runs a private piano teaching studio in Burlington, VT.

DR. SARAH PRAGER (OUR BODIES, OUR DOCTORS)

Dr. Prager is UW associate professor in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology. She is the director of the Family Planning Division and Family Planning Fellowship.



PATRICIA PRESTON (MR. TOILET: THE WORLD'S #2 MAN) Patricia is the Executive Director of the VCWA. This past September she facilitated an exchange to connect future leaders

and mentors invested in women's health, innovation, and equity in Tanzania. The students chose an issue to focus on and drafted plans to address it. The Tanzanian group chose to tackle the lack of accessibility of women's sanitary products. These products are often expensive or otherwise inaccessible, and seeking them out carries the weight of a deep stigma. The VCWA is proud to support *Mr. Toilet: The World's #2 Man*, as we feel connected to spreading awareness of sanitary health and hygiene and supporting young leaders to evoke change in their communities.



ALEX RIVERA (THE INFILTRATORS)

Alex is a filmmaker who has been telling new, urgent, and visually adventurous Latino stories for more than twenty years. His first feature

film, *Sleep Dealer*, won multiple awards at the 2008 Sundance Film Festival and the Berlin International Film Festival.



BARBET SCHROEDER (THE VENERABLE

W.) Schroeder started his career in French cinema in the 1960s, working with directors such as Jean-Luc Godard and Jacques Rivette. Since the

late 1980s, he has directed big budget Hollywood films such as *Single White Female* and *Murder by Numbers*. He was nominated for the Academy Awards and the Palme d'Or for his 1987 *Barfly*. He has also made a series of documentary films such as *General Idi Amin Dada: Autoportrait. The Venerable W.* is in this style of letting the subjects of the films condemn themselves.



LEA TSEMEL (ADVOCATE) Lea is an Israeli lawyer known for her work in support of Palestinian rights. She defines her career as one involving "everything [that occurs] between

the Palestinians and the authorities" and gained fluency in Arabic over five decades of representing Palestinians in court.



PROF. LUIS VIVANCO (NOTHING FANCY: DIANA KENNEDY) Prof. Vivanco is a cultural anthropologist and co-director of UVM's Humanities Center. His scholarship focuses on understanding

the cultural and political aspects of environmental change and efforts to "save nature" through environmental social movements.

DAVID WRIGHT (ALAN MAGEE: ART IS NOT A

SOLACE) David is an award-winning director and cinematographer (Emmy & BAFTA) and has worked in over 60 countries. He shoots stories relating to both environmental and human justice issues, plus works on television series such as David Attenborough's *Life* and *Frozen Planet*.







PETER ACKERMAN (A CAVE YOU FEAR TO ENTER & GAME DINNER) Peter is a Danish-American filmmaker and graduate of the University of Vermont's Film & Television Studies Program.

His films explore the ways in which we understand ourselves as part of nature, as well as removed from it. He currently works full-time as Videographer for an animal health company in Portland, ME.



MARIA T. ALVARADO (THE COLLECTOR)

Maria is a creative producer and editor for promotional campaigns [HBO Latin American Group, Discovery Channel] and creates videos focusing on arts,

gastronomy, and events.



CODY BALL (*RECOVERY COUNTY*) Cody is a documentary cinematographer and editor from Western Massachusetts, and is currently based in Brooklyn and Los Angeles. In both his branded work

and original films, Cody seeks to bring out deep human truth in seemingly small stories, with the hopes of sparking meaningful conversation of all shapes and sizes.



JASON BÉLIVEAU (MIDNIGHT AT THE OASIS) Jason Béliveau is the programming director for Antitube, an organisation dedicated to film screening in Quebec City. He is also a film critic

for the magazines *Spirale et Séquences* and a radio and television columnist. *Midnight at the Oasis* is his first short film.



DEMETRIUS BORGE (CAROL STREET)

Demetrius has been producing videos since he accidentally erased all the family photos during a summer trip. He co-owns 273 Productions where

he has worked as a producer, director, editor, and cinematographer on short films and commercials. *Carol Street* is Demetrius's debut festival appearance.



JOHN GRIESEMER (LITTLE BEERY'S MARCH) John is a filmmaker, actor, and novelist. He lives in Lyme, NH and wrote and directed the web series Parmalee.



GARRETT HARKAWIK (DOOM VIBRATIONS)

Garrett is a southern Vermont-based documentary filmmaker and composer, whose work has been featured in *The Atlantic*, *Aeon*, and *Short of the Week*.

Precious Guru is my first film and a 7-year labor of love that came to fruition due to the support of many hands and talents.








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
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
