INTERNATIONAL SUBMISSIONS TO THE 2023 ACADEMY AWARDS

There are 93 submissions in the Best International Feature category to the 2023 Academy Awards. 15 have been shortlisted, 5 will be nominated. 1 will win. Our festival is focused on the origins, not on the results.

Every country flies a flag. There is much to be learned about global cultures by examining how they wish to be seen and judged by others. As in so many other competitive spheres, there is a hierarchy of submitters. At the top are countries who choose a film that has a strong chance of making its way through the Hollywood system to prove that they are "insiders", whereas others, without connections, hope to be finally heard on the world stage: Tembele (Ghana) and Mediterranean Fever (Palestine) are two such examples. And then there is a third category: countries who wish to show their liberal credentials by selecting films about human rights issues of other countries, often made by exiled directors. For the latter, one need look no further than Denmark who for two years running has submitted films about human rights issues in other countries (Flee - Afghanistan) and this year Holy Spider (Iran), or Canada with Eternal Spring (China).

Each of the 11 films in this festival speaks for a different culture and way of thinking. We hope you will be as inspired by them as we are.

A fascinating historical re-enactment of a major historical moment in Argentinian history. The film succeeds in balancing the pathos of the David-vs-Goliath Trial of the Juntas with a lightness of touch, depicting how a young lawyer, and an inexperienced legal team dared to prosecute the heads of Argentina's bloody military dictatorship and bring them to justice in a race against time.

Three young girls at the cusp of womanhood try to defy the persistent winter darkness in Finland by trying to draw their own contours. In the process, they move between dreams, reality, friendship and relationships, and try to make sense of the whole mess.

Set in Iran but shot in Jordan, this is Ali Abassi's third feature (his celebrated debut Border played at VTIFF in 2018). Female journalist Rahimi travels to the Iranian holy city of Mashhad to investigate a serial killer targeting sex workers. Constructed as a thriller, the film is also a clear, multi-faceted picture of many obstacles and challenges that Iranian women face. Based on the true story of the 'Spider Killer' Saeed Hanaei, who saw himself as on a mission from God as he killed 16 women between 2000 and 2001.

After decades abroad, a man returns to his neighborhood in Naples for closure. Based on Neapolitan author Ermanno Rea's novel, it is set and shot in Naples' vibrant Sanità quarter, in the heart of the city. Nostalgia, exquisitely shot and acted, is a story about mothers and sons, about gangsters and priests, and about a peculiar kind of longing for the past in a place where little has changed for hundreds of years.

The film treads a thin line between reality and make belief to produce a surrealist, psychological drama.
